

Irish and Irish “wannabees” to celebrate St. Patrick’s Day with prayers, parade and fun

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Although Old Brooklyn is not decidedly Irish in the way in which some west side Cleveland neighborhoods are (e.g., West Park and Kamm’s), nevertheless, for at least the past several years, the March issue of the *Old Brooklyn News* has featured something related to the city’s Irish heritage.

In the past we’ve talked about the history of the St. Patrick’s Day parade in both America in general and in Cleveland in particular, the historical St. Patrick, our Irish councilmen and, of course, the details about the current year’s parade.

We also borrowed an idea from a contest which appeared several years ago in the now defunct *Cleveland Free Times* called “You’re so Cleveland if...” and converted it to “You’re so Irish if...”

That “You’re so Irish if...” article was the first of numerous nationality articles (Polish, Italian, Jewish) we’ve since run, and it will also be the main theme of this year’s St. Patrick’s Day article. We can think of a seemingly infinite list of attributes and historical contributions of Clevelanders whose heritage is Irish! But first, the details of this year’s parade –

Cleveland’s 145th (though not in the same way we know it today) St. Patrick’s Day parade on Thursday, March 17th, will step off at 1:04 p.m. at the intersection of E. 18th St. and Superior Ave. As has been the case for the past two years, the parade will travel west to East Roadway (on the east side of Public Square), then north one block to Rockwell Ave., and then back east to E. 6th St.

One of America’s largest St. Patrick’s Day parades, thousands of Greater Clevelanders — in bands, drill teams, marching units or otherwise on foot, on floats or driving a variety of vehicles — will be participating in it. And now, before we return to part II of “You’re so Irish if...” let me remind you that you can reread my thoughts about being Irish from two years ago by visiting the Old Brooklyn Community Development Corporation’s website, www.oldbrooklyn.com,

and clicking on the link to the *Old Brooklyn News*. In the online archives there you will find the March 2009 edition of the paper; the story about the Irish begins on the front page.

So again I propose that “You’re so Irish if...”

...you consider St. Patrick’s Day to be a national holiday and you start preparing for it in February;

...your family has its own “spot” on the St. Patrick’s Day Parade route; some of your family members may even be participating in the parade;

...either way, you know many of the people in the parade and think nothing of calling out to them as they pass by;

...at any social gathering, you can’t resist relating what you think is an amusing vignette; in fact, you can’t wait for the other person to stop talking so that you can start talking;

...for as long as you can remember, the men in your life have been telling “Pat and Mike” jokes — some with genuine brogues, some with incredibly good imitation brogues — at social gatherings;

...at least one of your cousins is a policeman and another of them, a fireman;

... you know the old class distinctions of Lace Curtain Irish (the educated, upper class) and Shanty Irish (the working class poor who may not have even had curtains!);

... you’ve attended events at both the Irish American Club — East Side, at 2270 Lake Shore Blvd. in Euclid, and the West Side Irish American Club, 8559 Jennings Rd. in Columbia Station;

... you know that a branch of the Celts were the original inhabitants of the Emerald Isle, having migrated there from central Europe circa 300 B.C., and that the name of the tribe of those early folk who went there (as well as to present-day Scotland and the Isle of Man) was the Gaels; Gaelic refers to the culture and the language of the Gaels, though eventually their English rulers wouldn’t let the Irish speak their native Gaelic tongue;

... although you don’t speak Gaelic, you know that “Céad Mile Fáilte” means you are welcome a thousand times over

wherever you come from, whosoever you be;

... you’ve been to Ireland and kissed the Blarney Stone (in addition to being full of blarney yourself);

... you’ve purchased at least one fisherman knit sweater and one piece of Irish linen at the duty free shop in Shannon Airport on your way home from a trip to “the olde sod”;

... you know that many of the Cleveland Irish are descendants of people from County Mayo;

...one of your female ancestors was an Irish “washerwoman” (a lady who earned her living by washing other peoples clothes and linens); another was on the housekeeping staff of one of the mansions which once lined Euclid Ave.;

... you are accustomed to answering the question, “To which Brennan/Burke/Byrne/Carroll/Casey/Cavanaugh/

Collins/Connolly/Cullen/Cunningham/Daly/Donnelly/Duffy/Dunne/Farrell/Fitzgibbons/Fitzgerald/Fitzpatrick/Flanagan/Flynn/Gallagher/Grady/Griffin/Kelly/McIntyre/Higgins/Hughes/McMahon/MacNamera/Maguire/Maher/Maloney/Mahoney/McCarthy/McDermott/McDonnell/McLaughlin/Moran/Murphy/O’Brien/O’Callaghan/O’Connor/O’Doherty/O’Keefe/O’Leary/O’Malley/O’Neill/O’Reilly/O’Rourke/O’Shea/Quinn/Ryan/Sheehan/Sullivan/Sweeney/Walsh, etc. family do you belong?”;

...because you have a much wider than average circle of family and friends, you start paying attention to the death notices in the paper at a much younger age than most people do; you call them the “Irish Sports Pages” and read them religiously every morning;

New Old Brooklyn Connected Wi-Fi tested over three-day President's Day weekend

An important milestone was passed in February as the Old Brooklyn Connected Wi-Fi underwent its first live testing. This President’s Day weekend test of the *Old Brooklyn Connected* Wi-Fi was performed in the neighborhood surrounding Estabrook Recreation Center, north of Memphis and between Fulton Pkwy. and Ridgeview Rd. Nearby areas may have also been able to ‘get connected’ during this testing phase.

Households in this area received flyers and robocalls prior to the test to let them know that they should boot up their wireless computers and give the network a try. Early reports from the test weekend show that many residents were able to get online with relative ease, connecting to the network SSID (name) “OldBrooklyn”.

After the test weekend the network returned to “invisible” mode to continue testing, but residents might still see the network listed as “Unnamed Network” and be able to connect by typing in the SSID “OldBrooklyn”.

Dozens of residents took the next step and helped to improve our network by completing the short survey posted on our website, www.oldbrooklynconnected.com. The feedback they provided has already helped the network technicians to determine which areas to focus on as the network pushes towards completion.

Many residents have begun to inquire about the availability of the CPE antenna, or wireless modem. We are continuing to develop a distribution plan. Depending on the needs of each household, different models will be available for in the \$35 to \$70 range. (We are not sure of exact pricing yet.)

For households with multiple computers, or those desiring the highest level of service throughout their home, the more expensive model is recommended. For those with one computer, the \$35 model may be adequate. More information about CPE antennas will be at our website, www.oldbrooklynconnected.com, soon and in future editions of the *Old Brooklyn News*.



Former pastor shares BMUMC early history

I was asked to record some history about Brooklyn Memorial United Methodist Church (BMUMC) after it closed in December.

It is very difficult to find accurate accounts of the history of any event. I have spent twenty years or more researching Methodism in the Cleveland area and have been led in so many directions over the years. I have written many articles which at the time I thought were authoritative only to find later that I had been led astray one more time.

Religious services had begun in Cuyahoga County as early as 1814 with bible study and prayer meetings in the home of Ozias Brainard. They included the Fish and Brainard families and Christians from both a Methodist and a Congregational persuasion.

About nine months after the organization of the Brooklyn Methodist Episcopal Church (BMEC), a church made up of folks who were Congregational in background was formed. This original church was Presbyterian because the Presbyterians and the Congregationalists had divided the Western Reserve into areas of influence which included both Presbyterian and Congregational preachers.

So what we know now as the Archwood United Church of Christ was for a while served by Presbyterian preachers.

The following excerpt from the Journal of the North East Ohio Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church of 1907 shows the beginning of our Mission work west of the Cuyahoga River --

In 1817 Jacob Ward, a local preacher from Brunswick, found four Fishes and four Brainards and organized the Brooklyn Memorial Church, the mother Church.

Mr. Ward also organized a number of preaching points throughout the western part of Cuyahoga County.

At the Annual Conference of 1817 the Reverend John C. Brook was appointed to the "Huron Circuit". But Brother Brook, finding ample room for a four weeks' circuit east of the Black River, did not go west of the Black River. He called this circuit the "Cuyahoga Circuit".

In the Conference year, 1818-1819, in what is now the "Tuscarawas District", Charles Waddell, Presiding Elder, appointed Ezra Booth and Dennis Goddard to the "Cuyahoga Circuit" with BMEC as the northernmost preaching point.

In 1908 the Presiding Officer addressed the members of the Annual Conference by saying:

For two years in succession Cleveland District has had the honor of entertaining the North Ohio Conference. We welcome you most heartily to the Queen City of Ohio; to our Churches and to our homes, for we expect that the homes of our Churches will receive great inspiration from your presence in them. Your coming enables us to celebrate the ninetieth anniversary of the organization of Cleveland Methodism.

(The "Cuyahoga Circuit" later became known as the "Brooklyn Circuit".)

On April 1st, 1930, Leonard Gurley Foster of 3007 Archwood Ave., then ninety years old, wrote a short history of the four church buildings of BMUMC which he'd attended:

When four or five years old I went with my father Ebenezer Foster to attend the first meeting place of the Methodist church people. It was located about twenty feet inside from the entrance of the old Brooklyn Cemetery. It was a small one story building about 16 by 24 (feet), it had a sawdust floor and wooden benches to seat about one hundred persons. The women were seated on the East side and the men on the West. The Minister had a chair and had a table in front - on the north side. I learned that some took off their shoes before entering, they doubtless had read and believed (Viz) - 'Take off thy shoes for this is holy ground'. This meeting place was of short duration. Mr. Ebenezer Fish, father of John Fish, who gave the cemetery land, gave the corner lot on Newburgh and Twenty-fifth streets (site of the Shell Station) to the Brooklyn M.E. Church to build a large two story Church. They built and used it - for more than fifty years. In those early days many were converted and received - love, joy and peace.

In regard to this first two story Church on the corner of 25th and Denison, I remember this incident very distinctly. When about eight or nine years old, on going home from school, I stopped near the Church, and I saw Daniel Fish standing on the peak of the Church, and soon Levy and Ozias Fish came along - from hunting. They stopped on the south side of Newburgh St to view the Church, and Daniel called to them and said, "I have just put on the last shingle". And Levy said "Hold up a shingle and see me put a hole through it." And Daniel took a shingle in his left hand, and facing south, he stretched out his hand with the shingle. Then Levy fired and put a hole through it. They all seemed glad that the shingles were all on, and the Church completed and ready to occupy. After many years the M.E. Church built two other large Churches, one on Twenty Fifth Street and one on Archwood Avenue."

The Kick-off Meeting will present the plot diagram for the season and provide an opportunity for gardeners to pick up the free seeds provided by the Garden Committee and the City of Cleveland's Summer Sprout Program (administered by the Ohio State University Extension Service). The agenda will also include a 50/50 Raffle and sale of Garden T-shirts.

Weather permitting, the Garden generally opens circa May 15th. Each season BFCG gardeners not only grow produce for themselves, relatives, friends and neighbors, but also donate between 5,000 and 6,000 pounds of fresh herbs and vegetables to local food pantries and kitchens including the Brookside Center, St. Herman's House of Hospitality and St. Augustine Church's Hunger Center.

Riverside burials starting to be indexed

Members of the Cuyahoga Valley Genealogical Society (CVGS), with assistance from other genealogy groups, have started to index the 53,000+ burials at Riverside Cemetery, 3607 Pearl Rd. The hours open for volunteering at Riverside are Monday thru Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Interested individuals who would like to help CVGS with this indexing project are asked to contact John at 216-524-3472 and let him know the day or days they are available to volunteer.

Each of the seventy record books at Riverside contains 700 to 800 names. Each volunteer will be assigned a book to work on; he/she must have his/her own laptop computer to use for the project.

CVGS is using an Excel spreadsheet to record the name, date of death, date of burial, and lot, section, grave and page number of

each person in the record book. Several of the Cemetery's record books have already been completed.

Volunteers are also needed to proof-read the data extracted from the Cemetery books and entered onto the computer spreadsheets. These volunteers will not need to bring their own laptops for proof-reading.

The indexing at Riverside is a community project. When it's completed, it will help genealogists locate their ancestors more easily. The Cleveland Cemetery Indexing project is now finished and can be accessed online at: <http://www.rootsweb.ancestry.com/~ohcdrt/clecems/index.html>

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"There's grass again," I heard a little neighbor girl exclaim during the "February thaw" week which preceded this again cold, snowy, icy week when we readying the March issue of the *Old Brooklyn News* for the printer.

True to their name, my snowdrops had actually been blooming under the snowdrifts; I hadn't realized that any spring bulbs do that, and was delighted to find them when the snow covering them melted. (By this time next month, the crocus will probably have bloomed, too.) But now they're buried again.

We've included some February photos on page 6. The one of the ice-coated trees is hauntingly beautiful, but it doesn't tell the whole story of residents who had driveways blocked by huge downed tree limbs or were without power because of the ice storm.

I often begin this column by sharing some follow-up news we've received from the last issue. This time, though, the follow-up I'm about about to relate was from two issues ago,

because I didn't have room for it last month. It's one of those small world stories...

A major article in our January edition was an obituary about the three former Deaconess Hospital chaplains who had passed away within a year of each other -- **Rev. Herb Reichert, Fr. Raymond Schultheiss, C.P.P.S. and Fr. John Bolan, C.P.P.S.** Since Rev. Reichert lived in Greater Cleveland, I got my information about him from his in-town family. But I had to contact a woman who works in the Missionaries of the Precious Blood's (i.e., the C.P.P.S.) provincial office in Dayton for information about the two Catholic priests.

After the article was published, I mailed a copy of the January paper to the C.P.P.S. office and received in return an amazing response from contact person **Catherine Babcock** --

Not only is Catherine a former Cleveland, but until the Sixties, she and the rest of the Babcock family had lived in Parma right next door to the Reicherts! The families had kept up for quite a while after the Babcocks relocated, but lost touch in recent years. Our obituary turned out to be life-giving in eliciting a flurry of email activity between the now-grown Reichert and Babcock children.

There was some back and forth emailing between me and one of Catherine's brothers, too, after we made the further connection that **Bob Babcock**, a Padua grad, was one of my brother's housemates at the University of

Dayton in the Seventies and, after graduation, an attorney who did legal work for us.

(Not every good work which the *Old Brooklyn News* performs has to do with community development issues!)

And while I'm on the topic of hospital chaplains, we've learned that the Roman Catholic chaplain at **MetroHealth Medical Center, Fr. Arthur Snedeker**, retired March 1st. While at Metro and until Our Lady of Mercy Church in Tremont closed in mid-May, Fr. Snedeker lived at that parish; then he moved to **St. Thomas More** Church.

Despite repeated attempts, at press time I am still waiting to find out who the Diocese of Cleveland will send to MetroHealth to replace Fr. Snedeker, and whether or not he will continue to live in our neighborhood. He'd been chaplain at Metro for almost eleven years, since April 28th, 1998.

In mid-December **St. Peter Chanel High School** sent me an email informing me that for the first time in their history, the school's boys' soccer team, the Firebirds, had played in the District Championship game.

As I often do when I receive such emails, I shot back an email to their PR person with the question -- "Do any of the players live in Old Brooklyn?" Yes! came the person's enthusiastic reply -- senior **Tim Dubbs**.

In addition to being good sportsmen, the Firebirds are also good students. Because their average GPA exceeds 3.6, they are considered an "All-Ohio Academic Team".



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Senior lawn cutting program taking applications for 2011

The City of Cleveland's Department of Aging is now accepting applications for the 2011 grass cutting service for senior citizens. A combination of full-time and part-time staff and Court Community Service workers will provide this valuable service to seniors.

The service will begin on April 18th, continue through October 28th and be provided approximately once a month. This is a free service; however donations are accepted and are used to provide future services for seniors. The qualifications are:

- Everyone in the household must be 60 years of age or older. The only exception to this rule is if a member or members of the household is/are functionally disabled. If they are disabled they must provide a medical certificate confirming the functional disability.

- The house may be a single or two-family dwelling; it must be owner-occupied and located within the city of Cleveland.
 - Priority is given to frail, isolated, disabled and very low-income persons (using HUD guidelines).
- The clients' responsibilities are:
- Pets must be secured.
 - Property should be cleared of animal waste.
 - The client must notify the office when the service is NOT needed.
 - Clients should call when services are needed.

Pop UP Pearl coming soon to downtown Old Brooklyn

Our historic downtown district is about to get a great boost this May when Pop UP Pearl takes the stage. On May 21st, the Old Brooklyn Community Development Corporation and its community partners are taking the opportunity to create a demonstration "complete street". Complete streets are those that accommodate all users whether they are old, young, disabled, transit users, automobile drivers, cyclists or pedestrians.

Attorney General DeWine warns of tax scams

(COLUMBUS, Ohio) — Attorney General Mike DeWine today warned Ohioans to watch for e-mail messages and letters that claim to be from the Internal Revenue Service, but are actually scams designed to capture personal information.

"Scam artists know that this is tax season, and they are trying to confuse consumers who are preparing to file their taxes," Attorney General DeWine said. "The IRS will not communicate with you via e-mail to tell you about a problem with your taxes, and you should not click on links in any suspicious e-mail messages."

A Franklin County resident said he received an e-mail message that appeared to be from the Internal Revenue Service. The e-mail indicated that the consumer was late in submitting his W-2 form and instructed him to click on a link to send the updated form. Fortunately, the consumer recognized that the e-mail was a scam, and he did not click on the link nor provide any personal information.

Another consumer from Cuyahoga County reported receiving a phony 1099 form in an envelope marked "important tax return information." The bogus form stated that the consumer had won \$61,000.

Consumers should watch for signs of a tax scam, including:

- Messages from the "IRS" about a problem with your tax forms.
- Requests for personal information, such as your Social Security number.
- Forms or letters that indicate you have won a lottery or sweepstakes.
- Instructions to click on links that may direct you to a third-party website.
- Poor grammar or illogical statements.
- Threats that you will not receive your tax refund if you fail to respond.

If you receive a suspicious e-mail claiming to come from the IRS, forward it to the IRS at Phishing@IRS.gov. Remember not to click on any links in the message.

NewBridge Cleveland Center for Arts & Technology (NewBridge), located on the Euclid Ave. corridor along RTA's Health Line at E. 36th St., is a dynamic new initiative for youth arts education and market-driven adult career training. In this course, students will use these tools and filters to create a fantastic world of images, colors and organic and geometric shapes.
 - **Music Mixing & Production** - This class will introduce students to the world of commercial quality digital recording and mixing. This program, written by a 25-year industry professional, pairs state-of-the-art equipment with practical, working knowledge.
- NewBridge also provides job training programs intended to give unemployed and under-employed adults with a high school diploma or GED, the skills needed to secure meaningful, good-paying jobs in the health sciences and other professions, and provide them with the academic support needed to succeed

in the programs.

These programs are offered at no cost to participants, with no hidden fees. NewBridge only requires its students to attend classes and have a strong desire to work. The programs were developed after researching the types of jobs that Cleveland is lacking:

- **Pharmacy Technician Program** - Pharmacy technicians help licensed pharmacists prepare prescription medications, provide customer service and perform administrative duties within a pharmacy setting. They may retrieve, count, pour, weigh, measure and sometimes mix medication as well as establish and maintain patient profiles and prepare insurance claim forms.

- **Phlebotomy/Specimen Collection Program** - Phlebotomists collect blood samples used for medical testing or transfusion. In the rapidly growing medical field, a phlebotomist helps to reduce the workload of doctors and nurses by focusing exclusively on blood collection, particularly in hospitals and blood drives. Studies in phlebotomy also provide students with a foundation should they choose to pursue more advanced fields, including work as medical lab technicians.

Based on the highly successful Manchester Bidwell model established over 40 years ago by MacArthur Genius Award winner Bill Strickland, NewBridge's after-school arts programs aims to motivate high school students to remain in school and encourage them to view learning as a lifelong process.

Bill Strickland's believes that environment shapes behavior. "Change the environment. Change the assumptions. People are capable of extraordinary things"

Each year at Manchester Bidwell 85% of adult graduates get jobs, 90% of youth in its arts program graduate from high school and many continue on to college

NewBridge Cleveland joins three centers nationwide, replicating Manchester Bidwell and Strickland's theories of adult and youth training. The others are in Cincinnati, Oh.; San Francisco, Cal.; and Grand Rapids, Mich.

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St. Patrick's Day from front page

✱ ...when people in your family pass away, their wakes are held at west side "Irish" funeral parlors like Berry's, Chambers, Corrigan's and McGorray's;

✱ ... you think that the major difference between an Irish wake and an Irish wedding is one less person drinking;

✱ ... you very possibly feel that you become intensely poetic after a few beers;

✱ ... unfortunately, more than one member of your family has had a weakness for "the craiture" (whiskey) and has used alcohol to their own and their family's detriment;

✱ ... you know what it means when someone says, "He died of a terrible thirst";

✱ ... your uncles (family legend has it that even your "priest-uncle", who kept his parish afloat during the Great Depression in this manner) were into betting on the horses and were in close contact with their "bookies";

✱ ... your grandmother often referred to your grandfather as "Himself";

✱ ... your mother utters/uttered exclamations like "Perish the thought!", "Merciful heaven!", "Saints preserve us!" and "Holy Mother of God!"; she no doubt learned them from her own mother;

✱ ... you know the meaning of the expression "Irish twins" – children born to the same mother less than a year apart (some say eleven months apart, some say nine months apart);

✱ ... you can spell shillelagh (a short, heavy stick made from a knotty piece of blackthorn, oak or another hardwood which was

subsequently smeared with butter and placed up a chimney to cure, giving it its typical shiny black appearance) and know that although its gentler purpose was to be used as a walking stick, its other purpose was to be used as a club-like weapon;

✱ ... you own Waterford and/or Shannon crystal and Beleek and/or Royal Tara china; at least one of the pieces has shamrocks on it; in fact, you'll buy almost anything which has shamrocks on it;

✱ ... you can explain that shamrocks have been a symbol of the Irish since the time of St. Patrick because he used the image of three leaves on one stem to explain the mystery of the Trinity to the pagans he wanted to convert to Christianity;

✱ ... you realize, however, that Patrick is not the only Irish saint, and can rattle off the names of other Irish saints like Aiden, Brendan, Brigid and Columba.

✱ ... you believe, as do many historians, that "the Irish monks saved civilization" during the barbarian invasion of Europe;

✱ ... you're convinced that the Kennedy era in government truly was the American version of Camelot;

✱ ... you grew up knowing the importance of "Faith, Family and Friends" before it became a popular phrase (and the faith could only be the Catholic faith);

✱ ... your mother was a fan of Fr. Patrick Peyton, CSC, and his "Family Rosary Crusade"; she liked his slogan, "The family that prays together stays together" and she got you to recite the rosary together as often as she could; (The nations of today would do well to heed another of his slogans, "A world at prayer is a world at peace");

✱ ... you know that corned beef is a Jewish deli food, not an Irish food, though both ethnic groups eat cuts of meat which have to be simmered for a long time to tenderize them;

✱ ... you'll be joining a group of friends to attend a production of *Flanagan's Wake*, which is running through April 30th at Kennedy's Theater at Playhouse Square (see the listing in *Theater Notes*); you know that it's a unique interactive theatrical experience because you also saw it a few years ago when it was presented at the Powerhouse Pub in the Flats;

✱ ... you say "Safe home" to your family and friends when they leave your house, which is the same thing we are wishing you at the end of your St. Patrick's Day celebrations this year;

And now here's the information for the religious side of St. Patrick's Day —

The St. Patrick's Day Mass at **St. Patrick Church**, 3602 Bridge Ave., will be at 9:30 a.m. Auxiliary Bishop Roger Gries, OSB, will be the principal celebrant. The Cleveland Firefighters Memorial Pipe and Drum Band will again play the bagpipes.

The Mass at **St. Colman Church**, 2027 W. 65th St., will be at 10:30 a.m. Fr. Dan Begin, former pastor of the closed St. Cecilia Church and now an associate at the new Communion of Saints Church will be the celebrant; members of the West Side Irish-American Club will be in attendance.

The special St. Patrick's Day Mass at the **Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist**, at the corner of E. 9th St. and Superior Ave. downtown, will be at 10 a.m. At press time, the celebrant had not yet been determined. The Cathedral will also have its regular noon weekday Mass.

The Irish American Club – East Side will sponsor a 10 a.m. Mass at **Ss. Robert and William Church** at 367 E. 260th St. in Euclid. Fr. Gary Hoover, OSB, will celebrate the Mass.

As is the case every day, **St. Malachi Church**, 2459 Washington Ave., north of the Detroit-Superior Bridge, will have Mass at noon. The church once served the Irish community who lived and worked in that neighborhood, "the Angle".

Because the church is closed until it receives a decision from Rome regarding its appeal to remain open, **St. Patrick Church** on Rocky River Dr. in **West Park** will not be able to have a St. Patrick's Day Mass this year.

St. Pat's parishioners will, however, be marching in the St. Patrick's Day parade, and parishioners from the closed St. Casimir Church have already committed to marching with them. St. Pat's welcomes anyone else from a parish which has been recently suppressed to join them, too.

"Everyone," some folks say, "is Irish on St. Patrick's Day" and while many enjoy celebrating with them, others don't understand what all the fuss is about, or why descendants of this immigrant group receive so much attention.

Regardless of what your opinion is about that topic, it would be hard to deny that the daughters and sons of Ireland have maintained their ethnic identity as few others have.

And what makes it even more remarkable is that, after the English (the New Englanders), they were the first significant group of "foreigners" in Cleveland (c.1826, to help build the Ohio and Erie Canal), yet still their cultural ties remain so strong.

Erin go braugh! (Ireland forever!)

Brooklyn Centre Community Orchard, a project of Re-Imagining Cleveland

Many people want to revitalize Cleveland and there are many different ideas on what to do. One of the most recent was the Re-Imagining Cleveland grants that were awarded to re-purpose vacant lots into useful and productive lots for neighborhoods.

The program is a joint venture between the City of Cleveland, Neighborhood Progress Initiatives and the Kent State Urban Design Collective. The projects ranged from single lot expansion to market urban farming; all of them created sustainable land reuse and added value to the neighborhood.

One of these projects, the Brooklyn Centre Community Orchard, was recently completed at W. 34th St. and Louisiana Ave. The Orchard was a collaborative effort of many local volunteers who were dedicated to improving their neighborhood. The projects leaders were Johanna Hamm, Darren T.

Hamm and Brian Avery.

The vacant lot where the Orchard now stands was for many years a vacant lot owned by Norfolk Southern Railway. The lot had fallen into severe disrepair with high weeds and garbage. It was also a site for criminal activity.

After a lengthy process Norfolk Southern Railway agreed to allow the Orchard to be planted on the lot. Many hard-working volunteers dedicated their time and expertise to designing, cleaning-up and planting. In addition to the trees the group put in a path, solar powered lamp posts and a fence with an arbor.

Their work paid off last October when the commemorative ribbon cutting at the Orchard was held. The fruit from the trees will provide a great harvest and a source of pride for the community on what was formerly a blight in the neighborhood. Visit the Orchard to witness the "fruits" of a neighborhood dream.
